The Blue Heart is increasingly recognized as the international symbol against human trafficking, representing the sadness of those who are trafficked while reminding us of the cold-heartedness of those who buy and sell fellow human beings.

Warning Signs of Human Trafficking in public

- 1. Appearing Malnourished
- 2. Showing signs of physical injuries and abuse
- 3. Avoiding eye contact, social interaction, and authority figures/law enforcement
- 4. Seeming to adhere to scripted or rehearsed responses in social interaction
- 5. Lacking official identification documents
- 6. Appearing destitute/ lacking personal possessions
- 7. Working excessively long hours
- 8. Living at a place of employment
- 9. Poor physical or dental health
- 10. Small children serving in a family restaurant
- 11. Not allowing people to go into public alone, or speak for themselves

Valdez Native Tribe Social Services

Valdez Native Tribe is excited to host a Request for Alaska Native Foster Parents campaign! Due to numerous reasons, on average approximately 3,000 children a month, are placed in foster care homes in Alaska. Being an Alaska Native Foster Parent can assist Alaska Native children in a temporary, safe, stable, and nurturing home until they can be reunited with their families.

To be a Foster Parent you must be:

- At least 21 years old
- Must be physically and emotionally capable of caring for children, and have a healthy lifestyle
- Financially stable of supporting your own household independently of foster care reimbursements
- Three character references
- Your home must meet basic fire, safety, and sanitary standards
- Have additional room for the foster child to sleep, have privacy, and keep their belongings.

The placement of Alaska Native children is covered under the ICWA Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978. It states, "In any foster care or preadoptive placement, a preference shall be given, in the absence of good cause to the contrary, to a placement with (i) a member of the Indian child's extended family; (ii) a foster home licensed, approved, or specified by the Indian child's tribe; (iii) an Indian foster home licensed or approved by an authorized

non-Indian licensing authority; or (iv) an institution for children approved by an Indian tribe or operated by an Indian organization which has a program suitable to meet the Indian child's needs." If you are interested in becoming a Alaska Native Family Foster Parent, please contact VNT.
