February is Teen Dating Violence Awarenss Month

Dating violence is common in teenagers and young adults, so it is likely that you or someone you know could be affected by it. Knowing what dating violence is and how to recognize the signs of an abusive relationship can be an important first step. Whether you want to get help for yourself or a friend, want to learn more about dating violence, or think you may be acting abusively in your relationship, there are many resources available to you.

Signs of Teen Dating Violence

- **50% of young people** who experience rape or physical or sexual abuse will attempt to commit suicide.
- Females between the ages of 16 and 24 are roughly 3 times more likely than the rest of the population to be abused by an intimate partner.
- 1 in 3 young people will be in an abusive or unhealthy relationship.
- Roughly 1.5 million high school boys and girls in the U.S.
 admit to being intentionally hit or physically harmed in the last year by someone they are romantically involved with.
- In the United States, 25% of high school girls have been abused physically or sexually. Teen girls who are abused this way are 6 times more likely to become pregnant or contract sexually transmitted infection.
- Teens who suffer dating abuse are subject to long-term consequences like alcoholism, eating disorders, promiscuity, thoughts of suicide, and violent behavior.
- Violent behavior often begins between 6th and 12th grade,
 72% of 13 and 14 year old are "dating".
- 33% of adolescents in America are a victim to sexual, physical, verbal or emotional dating abuse.

Elizabeth Peratrovich was an Alaskan
Native civil rights activist. She was one of the
main driving forces to ensure the passing of the
Territory's Anti-Discrimination Act of 1945, the
first anti-discrimination law in the United States.

Elizabeth was born on July 4th, 1911 in Petersburg, Alaska. She was from the Lukaax Adi Clan of the Tlingit Nation. She was adopted by a Tlingit couple, Andrew and Mary Wanamaker. She married Roy Peratrovich in 1931 and together they spent their lives fighting for civil rights and against widespread discrimination against Alaskan Natives.

On February 6th, 1988 the Alaska Legislature deemed February 16th as Elizabeth Peratrovich Day.
